Admission

Specific entry requirements:

A student can only be admitted to a Dutch International School if he/she/they complies with at least **one of the following three conditions**:

- •The student has a **non-Dutch** nationality (or: also a non-Dutch nationality) and has a **parent that is working in The Netherlands** (or in a Dutch border region) for a **limited time****.
- •The student has the **Dutch nationality** and **has lived and gone to school abroad for at least two years** because a parent was stationed abroad.
- •The student has the **Dutch nationality** and has a **parent** (with whom the student will be living) **that will be stationed abroad within two years and for at least two years**.**

^{**}This is to be proven by a written statement of the parent's employer.

The International Baccalaureate (IB) develops people who help to create a **better and more peaceful world** through education that builds **intercultural understanding and respect.**



The Learner Profile is a list of characteristic students should keep trying to develop as they move through your life at high school.












4. ATL Skills



ATL SKILLS

Approaches to learning (ATL) are skills designed to enable students in the IB Middle Years Programme (MYP) to "learn how to learn."

Implementation would see ATLs implicitly and explicitly embedded into day-to-day learning experiences, so that students have opportunities to practice and incrementally develop a range of ATL skills.





5. The Six Academic subject

Three subject taken at higher level (HL)

AND

Three subjects taken at standard level (SL)

One subject of each group

OR

One subject from each of the first five groups and one 'free' choice from one of these groups



Group 1: Studies in Language and Literature (Language A)

- Dutch A Language and Literature course SL/HL
- English A Language and Literature course SL/HL
- School supported self-taught language Literature course at SL only



Group 2: Language acquisition(Language B)

- Dutch B Language acquisition course SL/HL
- French B Language acquisition course SL/HL (only if sufficient number of students choose the course)
- Dutch ab initio SL only
- Spanish B Language acquisition SL/SH (only if sufficient number of students choose the course)



Group 3: Individuals and society

- History SL/HL
- Business Management SL/HL
- Economics SL/HL
- Environmental systems and societies SL/HL (interdisciplinary subject)
- Global Politics SL/HL



Group 4: Experimental Sciences

- Physics SL/HL
- Chemistry SL/HL
- Biology SL/HL
- Environmental systems and societies SL/HL (interdisciplinary subject)
- Design technology SL/HL



Group 5: Mathematics

- Analysis and Approaches (AA) SL/HL
- Applications and Interpretations (AI) SL/HL



Group 6: Arts

Visual Arts – SL/HL

Music – SL/HL (only if sufficient number of students choose it)



6. The Programme Core

• The extended essay (EE)

An independent, self-directed piece of research, culminating in a 4000-word paper, that gives students the opportunity to investigate a topic of personal interest related to one of their IB Diploma subjects. It develops essential skills in research, critical thinking, and academic writing.

• Theory of Knowledge (TOK)

This course challenges students to reflect on the nature of knowledge, how we know what we claim to know, and the strengths and limitations of knowing. It develops critical thinking by encouraging students to make connections across disciplines and consider real-world implications of knowledge.

Creativity Activity and Service (CAS)

Students engage in experiences beyond the classroom to foster personal growth, collaboration, and community engagement. Through a balance of crative pursuits, physical activities, and service projects, student develop skills, reflect on their learning, and embody the IB learner profile.

7. Successful completion

Failing conditions:

- CAS requirements have not been met
- Candidate's total points are fewer than 24
- An N has been awarded for theory of knowledge, extended essay or for a contributing subject
- A grade E has been awarded for one or both of theory of knowledge and the extended essay
- There is a grade 1 awarded in a subject/level
- There is a grade 2 awarded three or more times (HL or SL)
- There is a grade 3 or below has been awarded four or mote times (HL or SL)
- The candidate has gained fewer than 12 points on HL subjects
- The candidate has gained fewer than 9 points on SL subjects.



8. Assessments in the DP

Internal assessments

Teacher-marked coursework, oral work, projects, investigations.

External assessments

Final written exams and some externally marked coursework.

For each subject, students receive a grade on a scale of 1 (lowest) to 7 (highest) reflecting both knowledge and skills such as analysis, critical thinking, and research, ensuring a balanced evaluation of achievement.




9. Guidance to university application
